

Community Health Workers (CHWs) across the globe are relied upon as a solution to shortages of professional health care workers, particularly in low-income countries. Without them, many people, especially in remote areas would not have access to any form of healthcare.

By passing down certain health care duties from qualified health care workers to CHWs, many health systems have prevented diseases from taking hold by ensuring early access to basic services. CHWs providing services in the communities they reside in also increase the health system's footprint, especially in places where there is a large rural population and access to a health facility is limited.

However, a key challenge is the adequate and cost-effective supervision and continued training of CHWs to ensure they can effectively support their communities. Over the last few years, there has been tremendous investment in scaling up CHW programmes with philanthropic and other private support. However, there has been no successful demonstration of how to cost-effectively scale a CHW programme to a national size, maintaining high-performance levels and impact - even with the use of innovative technologies and financing approaches.

At the heart of the problem is that many community health interventions are not designed for scale from the beginning. It is a problem that should be overcome at the start, rather than once a pilot has demonstrated some success at a small scale - otherwise they risk losing fidelity of approach that got them initial success, and being consigned to the grave of many noble but failed attempts.

This data will help to reduce the reliance on traditional supervision methods, such as costly face-to-face intervention. The research will horn in on specific CHWs activities which will best serve communities effectively, and the right level of targeted supervision for CHWs to drive down costs and ensure the maximum health impact.
